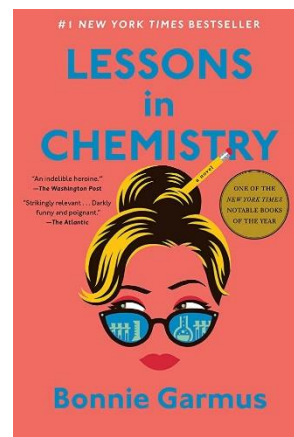

*Lessons in Chemistry* by Bonnie Garmus

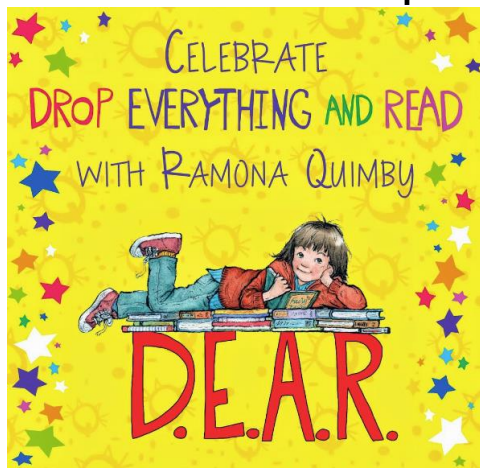

## MFOTL's Inaugural "Night of International Dance and Culture"

On March 11, 2023, a full house at the Moorpark High Street theater clapped their hands, tapped their feet, and took a trip around the world learning culture and history through dance. Thanks to Bollywood Beyondancing, Oxnard College Ballet Folklorico, Buckles and Bows square dancers and Amelia O'Shaughnessy Academy of Irish Dance the journey was educational and a whole lot of fun.

Our journey began on a trip to India with the Bollywood Beyondancing performers led by their director and choreographer Payal Wadhawan. They took us on a musical journey of Indian regional dances with a phenomenal fusion of vibrancy, rhythm, and energy. The combination of traditional and western music and the colorful costumes were a delight to watch. They showcased a Dandiya folk dance to honor the Hindu deity of Divinity Goddess Durga. According to tradition the dance "empowers people to honor the divine energy in every human being".



The next group of dancers brought us back home to the USA with one of our traditional folk dances, square dancing. Buckles and Bows square dance club was formed in the spirit of friendliness and good fellowship. They exist expressly for the enjoyment of square dancing. We enjoyed the flashy skirts, quick moves, and super energetic caller and also learned that square dancing is the state dance of California.



Next, Director Mati Sanchez took us south of the border to Mexico with Oxnard colleges Ballet Folklorico presenting dances from the states of Chiapas and Jalisco. The dances were full of color, festivity and contagious rhythm. Chiapas is located farthest south on the pacific coast and the costumes are influenced by the tropical flowers and climate of the region. We enjoyed Jalisco courtship dances and the energized Mariachi music had the audience on their feet.



Finally, just in time for Saint Patrick's Day, our dancers took us to the Emerald Isle of Ireland. Amelia O'Shaughnessy's Academy of Irish Dance performed eight traditional Irish dances including the three hand reel, slip jig as well as a traditional Saint Patrick's Day dance. Amelia educated us on Irish history, leprechauns, fairies and why Irish dancers always keep their hands by their side.
