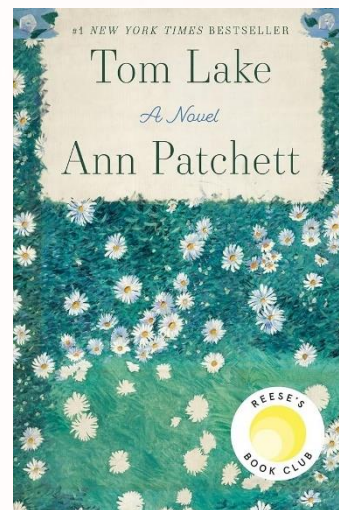
What Are You Reading?

Tom Lake (2023) by Ann Patchett

In the Spring of 2020, Lara's three daughters return to the family's orchard in Northern Michigan. While picking cherries, they beg their mother to tell them the story of Peter Duke, a famous actor with whom she shared both a stage and a romance years before at a theater company called Tom Lake. As Lara recalls the past, her daughters examine their own lives and their relationship with their mother, and are forced to reframe their understanding of the world they thought they knew.

This is a sweet story, much of it based around a theater production of *Our Town*, which I've never seen. This book explores tight bonds, frayed relationships, and moves along without any full-scale tragedy or catastrophic upheavals. It was nice to travel with Lara down memory lane.

International Libraries Tour – First Stop: The United Kingdom

Travel with us around the globe as we check out all the wonderful libraries the world has to offer! Our first stop is The Bodleian Libraries in the United Kingdom that support the University of Oxford. The principal University library, The Bodleian, has been a library of legal deposit for over 400 years and is one of the oldest libraries in Europe. It was first opened to scholars in 1602 and incorporates an earlier library built in the 15th century to house books donated by Humfrey, Duke of Gloucester, which included his priceless collection of more than 281 manuscripts. At present, the group of 26 libraries hold more than 13 million printed items, over 80,000 e-journals, rare books and manuscripts, classical papyri, maps, music, art, and printed ephemera (items expected to have short term popularity or usefulness). The Bodleian Libraries are the largest academic library service in the UK and one of the largest library services in Europe. The libraries also serve as a key part of Oxford's cultural community with exciting public exhibitions and events to engage the communities (<https://visit.bodleian.ox.ac.uk>).
